ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

March 25, 2020

The Carbondale Park District's Administration and Finance Advisory Committee held a regular meeting on Wednesday, March 25, 2020 at 10:00 am at Hickory Lodge, 1115 W. Sycamore Street, Carbondale, IL. The attendees participated via Zoom format.

PRESENT: Chuck Vaught, Steve Schauwecker, Curtis Vaughn, Mike Neill, Kathy Renfro and board liaison Commissioner Carmen Suarez.
Absent: Cordy Love.
Also present was Carbondale Park District staff member Aaron Dixon and guest Lee Fronabarger.

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER: The meeting was called to order at 10:01 a.m.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: Minutes of the February 24, 2020 meeting were approved.

OLD BUSINESS:

1. The committee reviewed and approved the proposed new format for the Treasurer's report.
2. The proposed lease extension for Lenus Turley Park and Tatum Heights Park was submitted for review. The committee approved the proposed lease.

NEW BUSINESS:

1. The committee reviewed the January 2020 balance sheet and the revenue and expense reports. The committee noted that due to circumstances beyond the district's control, the closure of facilities due to the coronavirus outbreak, revenue from user fees will be drastically reduced for the foreseeable future. This will create cash flow issues for the district up to and beyond the first half of the fiscal year. As a result, the district should scrutinize their expenditures in an effort to stretch their available resources as far as possible.
2. Kathy stated that hourly employees are on leave and salaried employees are mostly working from home while minimal required on-site work is being done. The district has issued two \$50,000 Tax Anticipation Warrants to date to supplement their cash flow. The Splash Park is on standby with an anticipated opening in early May at this time. It was noted that the first debt payment is due in June 2020.
3. The committee reviewed the proposal from Asaturian-Eaton for engineering services on the Marberry Arboretum project. The District received a State of Illinois Open Space Lands Acquisition and Development (OSLAD) grant in the amount of \$360,000 to develop accessible trails, a fishing pier and an indoor restroom at Marberry Arboretum. Total project cost is currently estimated to be approximately \$400,000 and Kathy stated that in-house labor is a grant eligible expense that can be applied to District's share of the project cost. The committee approved the proposed agreement for engineering services.
4. The committee reviewed the proposed Memorandum of Understanding between the City of Carbondale, The Kiwanis Club of Carbondale and the Carbondale Park District for the purchase and installation of accessible playground equipment at Lenus Turkey Park. The cost of the playground surfacing is not included in phase I of the project. The committee approved the Memorandum of Understanding subject to the determination of the type and cost of the playground surfacing that is required for the project.
5. The committee approved the bid specifications for the replacement of the sand filter at the Life Community Center. The bid specifications will allow the administration to investigate the cost and scope of the proposed project. This will allow the administration and the district to determine if they want to proceed with the project given the condition and their future use of the building.
6. The proposal from the General Energy Corporation to install LED lighting in the district facilities estimated that the district would realize a savings of \$2,383 per month. The district's cost of the project was \$2,378 per month for seven years (84 months). The committee felt that this was too close to breakeven to warrant taking the risk. The committee recommends that the administration look at alternatives or possible grants to achieve some of the benefits offered in the proposal.
7. The proposed contract between the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University on behalf of the SIU Women's Golf Team and the Carbondale Park District for the use of Hickory Ridge Golf Course facilities was reviewed by committee. The proposed contract is for a period of 25 years with an annual payment of \$3,000. The proposed contract replaces the current contract. The committee suggested some changes in the language of the contract, specifically the paragraph that relates to rent/consideration. The one-time payment of \$40,000 would not

ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

April 29, 2020

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER: The meeting was called to order at 10:04 p.m.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: None.

OLD BUSINESS:

1. The committee reviewed the February and March 2020 financial statements and the second draft of the amended budget. They also reviewed the cash flow statement and attempted to reconcile the actual expenditures reflected on the financial statements to data reported on the cash flow statement. Some discrepancies were noted and staff will review the report line by line to reconcile the cash flow statement to the revenues and expenditures. The corrections will be made and the report will be brought back to the committee for review.

2. The committee reviewed the proposal to seek additional tax anticipation warrant authority. To date, the district has issued \$200,000 of the \$500,000 tax anticipation warrants that are in the FY2020 budget. The district's bond council recommended that the district not rebid for additional tax anticipation warrant authority. They suggest that the district use the current lender if they move to issue additional tax anticipation warrants. It was suggested that the district administratively ask their current lender for an advisory line of credit. This will help in determining how much additional tax anticipation warrants the current lender would issue. This information would be used as guidance for possible future actions for the balance of the fiscal year. It is not known when or if all or only some of the district's operations will reopen to the public this fiscal year. As a result, the committee recommended that the staff look at different scenarios with varying dates the programs may reopen to the public and look at the effect on the cash flow needs of the district. This process will help determine whether or not the district may need additional tax anticipation warrant authority in addition to the amount included in the current fiscal year budget.

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER: The meeting was called to order at 10:07 p.m.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: Minutes of the April 20, 2020 and April 29, 2020 were approved.

OLD BUSINESS:

1. The committee reviewed the fourth draft of the amended budget. The draft presented several scenarios that estimated the dates that the operating units might be reopened to the general public. The actual date they reopen to the public is based on the State of Illinois recommendations and guidelines. The district is currently waiting on updated recommendations from the governor's office which are expected near the end of the month. As a result of press releases from the governor's office concerning upcoming revisions in the state's guidelines, the committee requested that additional scenarios be prepared with later opening dates specifically for Alice Wright Child Care, Kids Korner and Aquatics program at the Life Center. The district has already decided that the Super Splash Park will not open in 2020. The committee recommended that the Super Splash Park budget be incorporated and included in the General Fund but retain its separate operating budget. The committee also recommended that staff review the estimated revenues at Hickory Ridge Golf Course based on the restricted operations that are currently in effect.

NEW BUSINESS:

GOLF ADVISORY COMMITTEE MINUTES

November 5, 2019

The Carbondale Park District's Golf Advisory Committee held a regular meeting on Tuesday, October 1, 2019 at 4:00 pm in the Hickory Ridge Golf Course Clubhouse at Hickory Ridge Golf Course, 2727 W. Glenn road, Carbondale, IL.

PRESENT: Chuck Vaught, Elaine Vitello, Brian Matzenbacher, Mike Curtis and Board Commissioner Jane Adams.
Absent: Kay Brechtelsbauer, Dominic Cittadino, John Washburn, Stan Curtis, Trey Anderson and Mike Day.

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER: The meeting was called to order at 4:00 p.m.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: Minutes of the October 1, 2019 meetings were approved.

CITIZENS COMMENTS AND QUESTIONS: None.

OLD BUSINESS: None.

NEW BUSINESS:

1. **WOMEN'S ASSOCIATION:** No report, play is complete for the year.
2. **MEN'S ASSOCIATION:** No report, play is complete for the year.
3. **SENIOR ASSOCIATION:** No report, play is complete for the year.
4. **GOLF SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT:** Trey Anderson was unable to attend the meeting but provided the following information on course conditions for the committee:
 1. The greens were aerified on October 8 and 9, 2019. Dr. Sam Indorante from SIU will analyze core samples and the information gained from this analysis will be used to plan for the 2020 season.
 2. Granular fertilizer was applied after the greens were aerified to promote healing and root development.
 3. The zoysia grass in the fairways has gone dormant for the year.
 4. The staff continues to repair sprinkler heads. Some sprinkler heads are repaired rather than replaced. This approach can be less expensive than an outright replacement and it saves maintenance funds.
 5. The maintenance staff has also repaired leaks in the main irrigation line in three separate several areas.
 6. The bunkers continue to be an issue. Staff is spraying to eliminate the unwanted vegetative growth.
 7. The seasonal staff's last day in November 1, 2019.
 8. Winterizing the irrigation system is scheduled to be done the week after Thanksgiving.
 9. Trey is planning on attending an educational training session offered by WaterTronics. The training will focus on repairing Hickory Ridge's irrigation pump station. This will allow the startup, shutdown and other average repairs to be done in-house rather than be performed by an outside contractor. Prior repairs were done by a contractor from the St. Louis area, but he has retired. Other contractors are available but they are farther away and would have to travel longer distances to service the pump station and would therefore be more expensive.
5. **GOLF PROFESSIONAL'S REPORT:** No report. Mike Day did not attend the meeting.
6. **REVIEW FINANCIAL REPORTS:** The committee reviewed the August and September 2019 financial reports.
7. **COMMITTEE COMMENTS:** None
8. **COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS:**
 1. The committee recommends that management develop a structured formal payment/multi payment schedule with specific due dates for the sale of season passes. Currently some pass holders are paying "as they go" without specific due dates. Some outstanding balances are apparently being carried late into the year. This makes the collection process difficult for the Golf Operations staff.

2. The committee recommends that the golf superintendent develop a systematic multi year plan to repair and rebuild the sand bunkers at Hickory Ridge. The plan should review and evaluate the condition of the bunkers then prioritize which bunkers would be rebuilt first given manpower and budgetary restraints. This would establish an orderly process to determine which bunkers would be rebuilt in the near future. Bunkers with a lower priority would have additional sand added to them, when needed, until they move up the priority list to be rebuilt.

3. The committee recommends that the golf superintendent review and evaluate the condition of the equipment used by the maintenance staff. The purpose is to prioritize the equipment to develop an orderly multi year equipment replacement plan. Much of the equipment is of similar age. This approach would spread out the cost of replacing the equipment over an extended period of time rather than end up with larger cash outflows in any one or two fiscal years. Again, this would be subject to the budgetary constraints of the District.

GOLF ADVISORY COMMITTEE MINUTES

APRIL 7, 2020

The Carbondale Park District's Golf Advisory Committee held a regular meeting on Tuesday, April 7, 2020 at 4:00 p.m. at 1115 W. Sycamore Street, Carbondale, IL. The attendees participated via zoom format.

PRESENT: Chuck Vaught, Kay Brechtelsbauer, Dominic Cittadino, John Washburn, Brian Matzenbacher, Trey Anderson, Mike Day and board liaison Commissioner Jane Adams.

Absent: Elaine Vitello and Stan Curtis.

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER: The meeting was called to order at 4:01 p.m.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: None.

WOMEN'S ASSOCIATION: The Association has been in contact with its members and are on hold waiting for Hickory Ridge to open back up. The earliest opening date is estimated to be May 1, 2020.

MEN'S ASSOCIATION: The Association is on hold waiting on Hickory Ridge to reopen to public play.

SENIOR ASSOCIATION: The Senior Association has begun to organize its members and is on hold waiting on Hickory Ridge to reopen for public play. The Association has 50 paid members to date.

GOLF SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT: Trey Anderson provided the following information of course conditions for the committee:

1. The maintenance crew is only working with full time staff, mowing the roughs and mowing and spraying the greens. The fairways are beginning to come out of dormancy and will soon require mowing also.
2. A small area of the driving range was taken out of play and will not be mowed in the future. This will reduce the work load on the maintenance staff.
3. The irrigation system has not been turned on and staff is spraying the bunkers to kill unwanted vegetation.
4. Trey stated that he plans on aerifying the greens while the course is closed so that the turf can heal before the course is opened for play.

GOLF PROFESSIONAL'S REPORT: Mike Day provided the committee with the following information:

1. Mike announced that there are currently 41 season pass holders and stated that in the near future he will have to address the question about a possible reduced fee for a season pass due to the temporary forced closure.
2. The renewal of the gaming machine license is currently being completed and will be submitted to the City of Carbondale.
3. Mike stated that from what he has learned, there is no funding in the recently passed "Cares Act" for units of local government. He indicated that there may be something in the future.
4. Mike informed the committee that the District is reviewing a new contract between the District and SIU for the use of Hickory Ridge Golf Course by the SIU Women's Golf Team. The current contract was entered into in 2004 and was for a 25 year period. The proposed contract would replace the existing contract and would run for a 25 year period. The proposed contract increases the annual payment from \$1,000 to \$3,000, establishes the fees charged to visiting teams for the Saluki Invitational and provides for specific terms of the agreement, ie rent, fees and range access, to be reviewed and/or amended every three years. Mike did note that the SIU Men's Golf Team pays a \$3,000 annual fee but there is no contract between SIU and the District for their use of Hickory Ridge.

REVIEW FINANCIAL REPORTS: No financial reports to review.

COMMITTEE DISCUSSION:

1. Projected Opening Date: Currently the earliest opening date would be May 1, 2020. However this is subject to the state's mandate. The club house restaurant will open when the course opens.
2. Safety precautions for staff and customers: Mike stated that he does not know what the "New Normal" will be when Hickory Ridge reopens to public play. However committee member Dominic Cittadino offered to meet and

GOLF ADVISORY COMMITTEE MINUTES

MAY 5, 2020

The Carbondale Park District's Golf Advisory Committee held a regular meeting on Tuesday, May 5, 2020 at 4:00 p.m. at 1115 W. Sycamore Street, Carbondale, IL. The attendees participated via zoom format.

PRESENT: Chuck Vaught, Kay Brechtelsbauer, Dominic Cittadino, John Washburn, Brian Matzenbacher, Trey Anderson, Mike Day, Kathy Renfro and board liaison Commissioner Jane Adams.
Absent: Elaine Vitello and Stan Curtis.

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER: The meeting was called to order at 4:05 p.m.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: The minutes of November 5, 2019 and April 7, 2020 meetings were approved.

CITIZENS COMMENTS AND QUESTIONS: None.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS: The committee elected Chuck Vaught Chairman and Brian Matzenbacher Vice-Chairman for 2020 fiscal year.

WOMEN'S ASSOCIATION: The Association is still on hold. They had planned to delay league play until the governor's guidelines allow group play. However they are interested in possibly setting up league play similar to the schedule the Senior Association is attempting to use which is to set the pairings and then let the members set up their own tee times to play each other. This format is allowed under the current state guidelines.

MEN'S ASSOCIATION: The Association is on hold. Play is not expected to start before June 1, 2020 at the earliest.

SENIOR ASSOCIATION: The Senior Association will begin play the week of May 18, 2020 under a different format under the current regulations. The pairings will be set up by the administrators of the association and the two senior golfers that are scheduled to play each other will make their own tee times and play at some point during the week. This format will continue until the Hickory Ridge can operate without restrictions. The association will also use new forward red tees for seniors age 80 and over. The Women's Association was invited to use the new tee locations if they wish to do so.

GOLF SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT: Trey Anderson provided the following information of course conditions for the committee:

1. The maintenance staff verticut the greens two ways the week of April 21, 2020.
2. The greens were sprayed with fertilizer, Potash and a growth regulator. They were also sprayed to control poa annua.
3. Trey informed the committee that the fairway mowers have been repaired.
4. Trey stated that due to limited staffing levels, there is little time available to work on the bunkers. They are currently just praying the bunkers for unwanted vegetation. Trey indicated that he is working with what they have staff wise.
5. Under the current state recommendations, staff tried to raise the cups to reduce the surfaces that would normally be touched by golfers. They ended up using pool noodles cut to size to fit in the cup. The cup is shallow in depth and the golfer can more easily retrieve their ball. In addition the flag pins stay in the cup.
6. The irrigation system is now on line and available for use.

GOLF PROFESSIONAL'S REPORT: Mike Day provided the committee with the following information:

1. Mike said that Hickory Ridge reopened to the public on May 1, 2020 but there is a limited number of personnel working in the customer service operations at this time. The course is open for public play but the course is operating under a lot of restrictions.
2. The on line tee time reservation system is up and running and it requires a credit card for payment.

3. Mike informed the committee that he will begin his furlough on Thursday, May 7, 2020 and will return on June 8, 2020.

REVIEW FINANCIAL REPORTS: The committee reviewed the March 2020 financial report. Hickory Ridge was closed to public play in mid March but still managed to realize \$23,024 in revenue. Through the end of March 2020, financially Hickory Ridge is \$9,546 behind its budgeted position.

COMMITTEE DISCUSSION:

1. Revised Operating Procedures:

The Pro shop, restaurant, driving range and putting green are closed. The Pro shop is using a walkup window for access to the Pro shop personnel. Pull carts are not available for rental at this time. The gas powered golf carts are only available to those who can't walk the course, but they require either a handicapped parking card or a letter from a health professional stating that the individual can't walk the course. The cart is limited to only one individual per cart. Only two players are allowed per tee time and tee times are spaced out to every 15 minutes, which limits the number of players to eight per hour. The use of a mask is not required. Course hours are limited to 8:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. with the last available tee time at 4:30 p.m. daily.

2. Amended Budget:

The committee reviewed the amended budget for fiscal year 2020. The amended budget reflected three months of actual revenue and expenditures and estimated revenues and expenditures for the remaining nine months of the fiscal year. The district will review all operating budgets every thirty days.

COMMITTEE MEMBER COMMENTS AND QUESTIONS:

1. Committee member Dominic Cittadino commended both Mike Day and Mike Curtis for their assistance in helping developing procedures and guidelines for the Senior Association. They will allow the group to begin their 2020 season even if it is under a much different structure than normal.

2. Kathy informed the committee that the furloughs being taken by staff includes all the districts 18 full time employees. Part time staff is also working limited hours.

3. The committee members were asked to please respond to survey being conducted by the Carbondale Park District. It will help in the districts strategic planning process.

4. The committee was told that other groups in the golfing industry were attempting to get the state to amend the current restrictive guidelines as they pertain to the operation of golf courses.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS: None.

The crew has been mowing and picking up litter and trash weekly in the parks. Caution tape is replaced on the playgrounds when needed. The grass has started to grow more quickly in the last part of the month and the rains have made wet conditions.

Turley Park Mulch was applied to the Butterfly Garden for the season.

Super Splash Park The sump pumps are being regularly checked for proper operation.

David the mechanic replaced bushings on the zero turn and has serviced the lawn mowers.

Golf Course Superintendents Report

- The golf course moved from phase two to phase three in the *Restore Illinois* reopening plan. The most notable changes are: no note required to rent a riding cart, foursomes allowed and practice facilities and pro shop are open.
- Course Maintenance is still reducing touch points per state rules by keeping cupping areas raised and bunker rakes removed.
- Part time staff are slowly working increased hours as course maintenance demands increase and play increases.
- Full Time Staff at course maintenance are still following mandatory hour reductions that will amount to 5 full days for each full time position from May 8th through June 8th.

CITIZENS COMMENTS AND QUESTIONS: None.

REPORTS OF PARK DISTRICT CITIZEN ADVISORY COMMITTEES AND DEPARTMENT REPORTS:

Administration and Finance Advisory Committee - - Commissioner Suarez states that the Administration & Finance Committee reviewed budget adjustment scenarios and reviewed financials.

Child Care Advisory Committee - - Vice-President Sergeev reports the Committee discussed re-opening guidelines for the centers as well as what is needed to prepare and assure compliance with DHS and CDC guidelines. The Committee also discussed and emergency fund to assist in future times of need. Staff has also continued to host zoom calls with students and post activities online.

Golf Advisory Committee - - Commissioner Adams reports that golf course was closed for the month of April due to the pandemic. The Golf Committee discussed their re-opening guidelines for the course and how to effectively navigate regulations will still generating revenue.

Grounds, Facilities & Recreation Advisory Committee - - Commissioner Trimble reports that there were no actionable items at the meeting.

Treasurer's Report: None.

Directors Report: Director Renfro reports that there are no updates on the OSLAD grant, The Illinois Department of Natural Resources have closed their offices in response to the COVID 19 Pandemic. Area leaders continue to conduct a conference call on Monday mornings. Preliminary conversations with Jackson County indicate the first tax collection in 2020 will be delayed by 30 days and the second payment due sixty days later. The 2020 Sunset concert series has been canceled. There will be a Zoom meeting later this week to explore hosting Thursday Night Concerts at the Varsity Theatre and broadcasting them over YouTube. All Park District Events scheduled for April were canceled. The All Species Puppet Parade hosted a virtual parade. As of May 8 ,2020, \$200,000 worth of Tax warrants have been issued. The Administrative staff has been working closely with the Administration and Finance committee on cash flow projections. The revised budget will be presented later tonight for your review. Staff will be prepared 2 additional budget scenarios to be presented Monday May 18 to the committee for review. Golf May 1 – May 10,2020 2 part time staff are covering the pro-shop total revenue \$4359; Tee signs \$1,000, Passes \$3337, Fees \$871, Carts \$22.

Superintendents' Reports:

SUPERINTENDENT OF RECREATION: Superintendent report is included in the board packet.

SUPERINTENDENT OF CHILDCARE: Superintendent report is included in the board packet.

SUPERINTENDENT OF PARK MAINTENANCE: Superintendent Montgomery reports that Mowing of the parks and trash pickup are being completed routinely, as well as mowing in all parks. Caution tape is being replaced at playgrounds when needed. At Hickory Lodge air conditioning units were installed in the upper level and a lock was repaired on the lower level floor. A fundraising sign was installed at Turley for the Friends of Carbondale Dog Parks. The Mechanic replaced a gearbox on the zero-turn mower and has also serviced our fleet of mowers.

SUPERINTENDENT OF GOLF MAINTENANCE: Superintendent Anderson reports that the golf course opened for public play on May 1 with new regulations for golfers. The highlights are tee times spaced 15 minutes apart, twosomes only, no cart rental unless handicapped or unable to walk the course, and practice areas including the driving range are closed. Course Maintenance is reducing touch points for golfers by adding foam to the cup area that will not let the ball fall into the cup reducing the need to take the flag out, and also removing tees and bunker rakes to avoid multiple touch points. During the last budget adjustment part-time labor was lowered for the month of June after the previous reductions in April and May. We are currently operating at 25% capacity of our budgeted part-time labor. Full-time staff will start mandatory reduction in hours totaling 5 full days each position from May 8-June 8. We have severely reduced hours and are doing what is possible to keep up with scheduled maintenance. I appreciate all the staff is doing by pulling together in this challenging time. I will be attending a webinar on May 7th from IAPD titled "Golf is Back" about Illinois Park District golf and the re-opening of the sport at municipal courses.

SUPERINTENDENT OF GOLF OPERATIONS: Superintendent report is included in the board packet.

CONSENT AGENDA: Commissioner Adams would like to amend the April 13th minutes regarding the SIU Golf contract. It was then moved by Commissioner Adams and seconded by Commissioner Trimble to approve the amended consent agenda. Upon roll call vote, the following Commissioner voted aye: Adams, Trimble, Flowers, Sergeev and Suarez. Commissioners Absent: None. President Flowers ordered the motion passed.

After some discussion Commissioners recommend non-renewal of the park leases adding that this ultimate decision was not made lightly. The District will continue to maintain both parks through August 30th to give the city ample notice. The District will also request a lease prepared for the continued lease of the Kids Korner building. Upon roll call vote the following Commissioners voted aye: Adams, Trimble, Flowers, Suarez, and Sergeev. Commissioners absent: None. President Flowers ordered the motion passed.

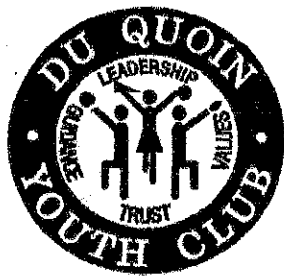

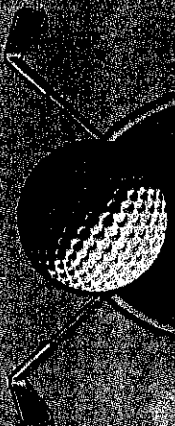

An open letter to Carbondale City Council members

Last week, Carbondale's City Council made important decisions regarding next year's budget. Because of the COVID-19 emergency closures, the City anticipates a significant shortfall in revenue. Nonetheless, as reported in The Southern (April 29, 2020), the Council approved City Manager Gary Williams' recommendation to not furlough any employees. Instead, the Council has redirected tax revenues from the food and beverage, package liquor, lodging, home rule and motor fuel taxes from the Local Improvement Fund to the General Fund for this fiscal year.

This is a time for the city to take seriously the need to help our local hospitality and retail businesses restart and to make the community attractive to visitors and residents.

This might make sense if the city was tightening its belt as most businesses and residents have been forced to do.

Instead, the city manager has stopped some, perhaps many, city services. The City of Carbondale is not enforcing our weed and grass ordinance; it has suspended the mandatory rental inspection program. With the City Hall/Civic Center closure, employees whose jobs required a lot of face-to-face contact with the public and who managed events and meetings now have no obvious work to do. Have these workers been reassigned to other jobs? Or do they remain on the city payroll?

If they don't have new assignments, they should be furloughed immediately, while the \$600 weekly federal stimulus monies can be added to their regular unemployment benefits and while city services are suspended. It makes no sense to defer a decision until fall, as the city manager suggested, after the stimulus program has ended and when city services may resume.

I don't understand the city government's reasoning. It makes no fiscal sense to me; it seems to be a wasteful and irresponsible use of taxpayer monies, and it appears to be a disservice to staff who may be furloughed in the fall.

I am a Park District commissioner, and I am gratified that the Park District is doing its utmost to be responsible with its revenues. As programs were shut down due to emergency orders, the already

very small staff undertook maintenance jobs that would normally have been done by seasonal and part-time workers.

This week, as nearly full closure was extended, all Park District staff have been furloughed — essential staff for one week (one day a week); everyone else, including department heads, for one month. I'm very proud of the staff who have pulled together to help the Park District, and the people of Carbondale, make it through these difficult times while keeping the parks open and maintained for the public to enjoy.

Our restaurateurs have taken an enormous hit, but they're stepping up to help our entire community through the Southern Illinois Kitchen Collaborative and other initiatives. People have taken it on themselves to make masks for frontline workers. Musicians are hosting virtual concerts like the Tuesday Closed Mic Night and the live-streamed Saturday night shows at the Varsity Center and the Marion Cultural and Civic Center. Southern Illinois University Carbondale is providing food and learning materials for their students.

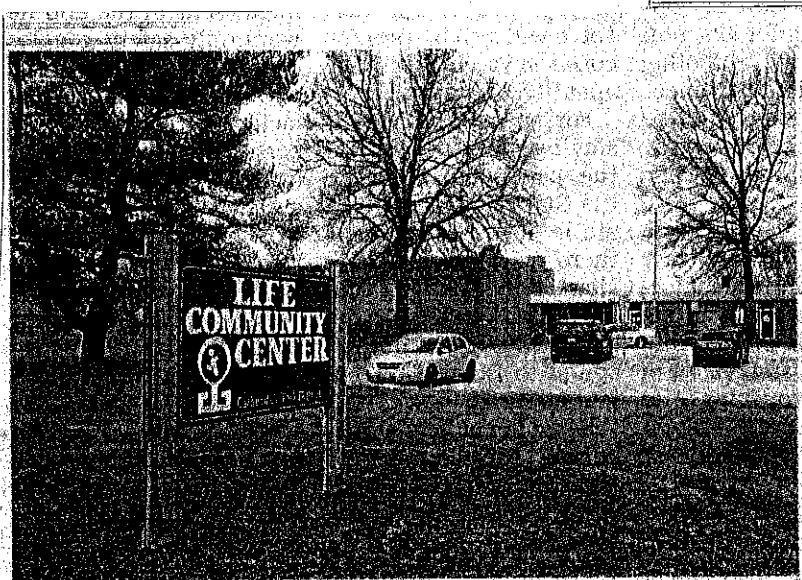
All over the region, people are stepping up to help those most deeply affected by this crisis. And several area cities and counties have furloughed staff.

This is a time for the city to take seriously the need to help our local hospitality and retail businesses restart and to make the community attractive to visitors and residents.

The hospitality taxes were earmarked, in part, for such initiatives. To sweep all those funds, without first furloughing temporarily redundant workers, is unconscionable.

Park District announces furloughs

Measure to affect 18 employees
as a result of revenue losses

CARBONDALE — The Carbondale Park District has announced it will furlough 18 employees because of lost revenue due to COVID-19 closures.

In March and again in April, Illinois Gov. J.B. Pritzker issued a series of executive orders to cut down on the spread of the sometimes deadly COVID-19 virus, limiting public gatherings and shuttering nonessential businesses.

As a result, all of the district's revenue centers have been closed — namely the Hickory Ridge Golf Course and the LIFE Community Center. Hickory Ridge did reopen May 1 with modified play. The

childcare centers, Alice Wright and Kids Korner, are closed. The Park District's Hickory Lodge offices are closed to the public.

A news release sent Wednesday says the park district "is implementing measures to ensure the financial stability of the agency." The release said the pandemic has "significantly" impacted business, and because of this, 18 full-time employees are being furloughed beginning May 8. Park District Executive Director Kathy Renfro said in an interview Wednesday that the furloughs will last 30 days, and — hopefully — end June 8.

Renfro said eight of those employees were furloughed entirely while the other 10 were furloughed for five days in the 30-day window. Renfro said these 18 full-timers make up the entirety of

the district's staff. The majority of the district's seasonal hires weren't made this year. Renfro said maintenance like mowing and general upkeep will continue during the furlough, though it will be harder to do without the help of seasonal workers.

announced likely furloughs last month, but opted not to take them until tax receipts are received in the summer. City officials said this would give them a better idea of tax revenue loss, and would allow the city to tailor furloughs to actual revenue instead of future projections.

Renfro said the park district wasn't able to do that. This is their peak time of year. Renfro said the constantly moving target of who is allowed to do

what and when and with how many people has made planning for the district's busy season extremely challenging. "It's like you are doing financial planning in a vacuum," she said. This is putting a strain on the already burdened park district. In recent years, the park district has struggled with capped revenue — it relies on property taxes from Jackson County — but increasing costs of doing business. This has led to deferred maintenance on proper-

ties. The district and the City of Carbondale were in talks about merging some portion of the park's operations with the city prior to the COVID-19 emergency. The Wednesday news release also reminded citizens about the altered operations of the district's operating properties. Hickory Ridge Public Golf Course is open, though with restrictions to maintain social distancing. The release said all basketball courts, soccer, softball and baseball fields are closed, as well as playgrounds. Parks are open, but the district asks visitors to practice social distancing. The decision to furlough staff was not an easy one to make. But, Renfro said, it's what was needed. "We're trying to respond proactively," she said. She said she did not want to wait until things got really bad to try and make a move. "We don't want to get so far down the stream we can't even swim back to the house," she said.

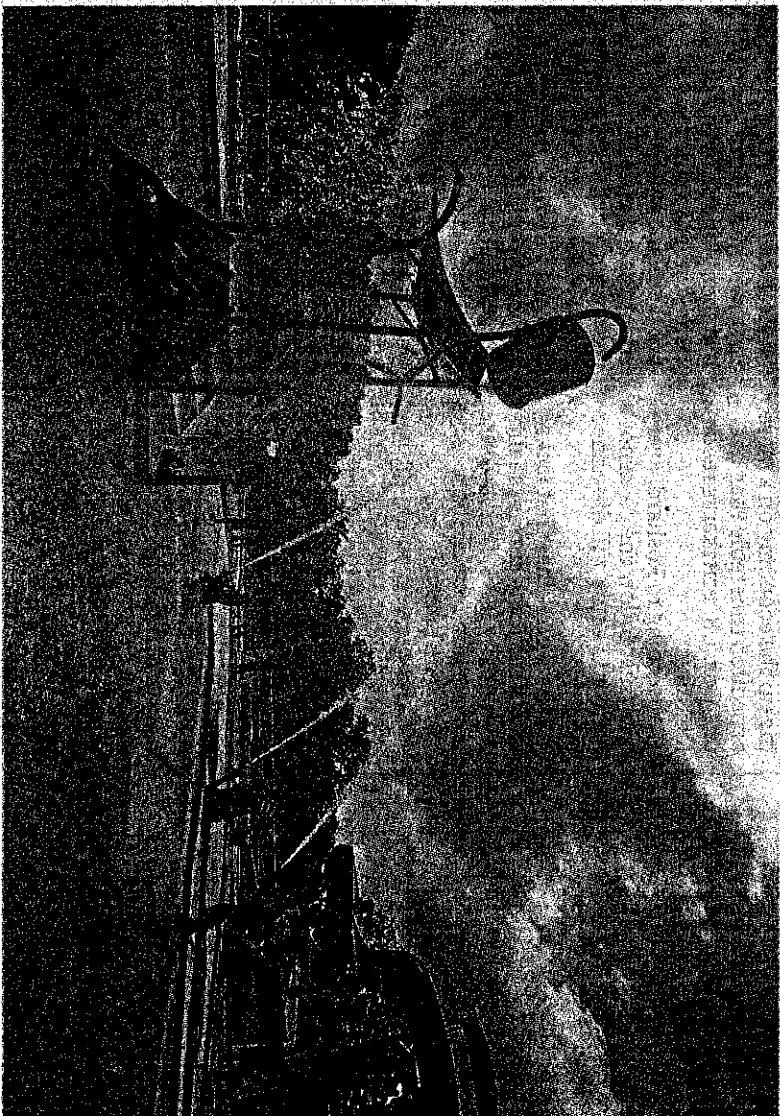

Park district to end leases at Turley, Tatum Heights

Responsibility will fall to the city

The troubled Carbondale Park District is apparently abandoning its interests in Turley and Tatum Heights parks abruptly telling the city on Tuesday that it is no longer seeking lease extensions on the two sites and will cease maintenance on them Aug. 30. In a letter sent to the city on

Tuesday, park district attorney Michael Twomey said that in the time since the park district first signed the leases in the 1970s, it's taken on a number of other financial obligations, including the Superblock, Hickory Ridge Golf Course and the Super Splash Park.

"These obligations, coupled with the current COVID-19

pandemic, have placed additional financial burdens upon the district that it cannot, at this time, continue to maintain without placing the district in further additional stress," Twomey wrote.

The sudden move by the park district would seem to mark a major turning point in deliberations between the two governmental bodies, which have been locked in a two-year impasse over the future of the city's parks and the declining fortunes of the park district.

What started in 2018 with the park district asking the city for a maintenance stipend as a condition of renewing some park leases quickly progressed to a 2019 ballot referendum asking voters if the two bodies should explore merging their operations. More than 70 percent voted yes.

In the time since, however, talks between the two, over how that merger might look have grown increasingly bitter and unproductive. With the park leases still hanging in limbo, the park district in January reiterated its stated need for financial help in maintaining the parks — a proposal some on the city council at the time called "an insult" and "a slap in the face."

The cash-strapped park

district remains hobbled by debt left over from the construction of Hickory Ridge Golf Course, as well as its inability to raise public funding through any mechanism other than its property tax levy, which is capped.

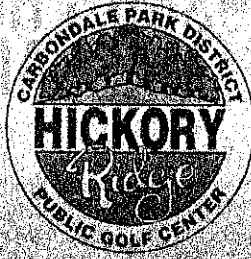
While the city owns the land on which some parks are situated, including also Evergreen Park, the park district also owns some of its own properties, including Hickory Lodge, the Super Splash Park and the golf course. In recent years, the park district has faced increasing criticism over the declining condition of some of those facilities.

The COVID-19 lockdown has made the park district's outlook even worse. With many of its facilities closed or public access to them greatly limited, the park district also announced on Tuesday that it will not open the Super Splash Park in 2020, representing perhaps another critical blow to its stability.

In this week's letter, Twomey said he is preparing a proposed lease to continue park district operations at the Kids Korner building, which is adjacent to Turley Park. Twomey also said that in anticipation of the Kiwanis Club's new accessible playground equipment planned for Turley Park, the park district will remove the existing equipment.

Building playgrounds that get kids **moving**

The right design can provide a needed nudge

The playground at Lake County Intermediate School in Leadville, Colo., was in desperate need of a makeover. The schoolyard didn't offer much — just a few swings, some rusty climbing equipment, a cracked basketball court and a play area of dirt and gravel.

In the spring of 2014, the community replaced the run-down equipment, installing a spider web-like climbing net, twisting slides and colorful swings. A new basketball court went in, along with a grassy play area and walking paths. Kids

got access to balls, Hula-Hoops and other loose equipment.

The overhaul did more than improve how the playground looked; it turbocharged the kids' recess activity. When researchers observed the playground that November, they found that the share of children participating in vigorous physical activity had tripled. And the changes appeared to last — a year after the overhaul, the students were still more active than they'd been before, the researchers reported in 2018 in the *American Journal of Preventive Medicine*.

"A lot of things, when they're new and shiny, lead to increased physical activity, but it's not always sustained," says Elena Kuo, a senior evaluation and learning consultant at Kaiser Permanente Washington Health Research Institute

in Seattle, who coauthored the study. “That’s why it’s a pretty exciting finding.”

Being physically active has many benefits for kids: It reduces obesity risk and improves overall physical and mental health, fosters social and emotional development and boosts academic performance. The World Health Organization recommends that schoolchildren get 60 minutes of moderate to vigorous activity every day. Most kids fall far short of that goal. Globally, 81 percent of 11- to 17-year-olds fail to hit that threshold, according to an analysis reported in January in the *Lancet*.

Playgrounds offer a chance to encourage kids to be more active in their everyday lives. “You’ve got a captive audience and a lot of kids,” says Kuo, calling outdoor play areas “an opportunity to have a high impact.” Overhauling playgrounds to encourage active play is gaining momentum, she says.

Scientists across the globe are studying how to maximize the opportunity that playgrounds provide. Research teams are using accelerometers, GPS tags and other wearable technology to probe how kids behave on playgrounds and are conducting randomized controlled trials to assess whether certain playground features, programs and designs can encourage kids to move more.

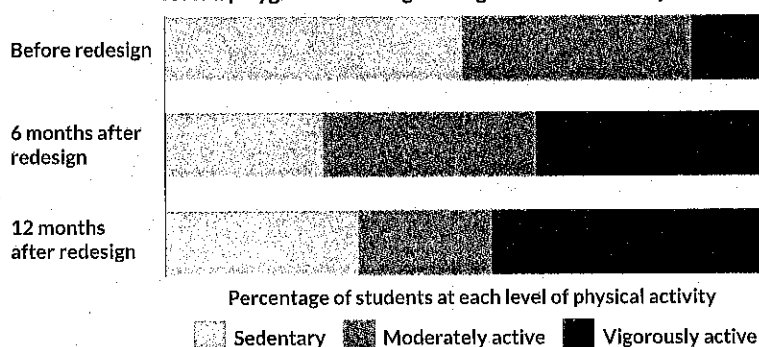
The results so far suggest that there are ways to subtly nudge children into being more active on playgrounds. And scientists say that there’s now enough evidence to begin making some specific recommendations to cities and schools that want to create playgrounds that foster movement. “When they come to us, we are now able to give them some pointers,” says Jasper Schipperijn, a sports scientist at the University of Southern Denmark in Odense.

While “evidence-based” playgrounds and playground-based programs won’t be a cure-all, they could make a real difference for some kids. “You’ll have children that will be active regardless of how their school or playground looks,” Schipperijn says. “But then there’s another group of kids that needs a bit more help.” (Editors’ note: During the coronavirus pandemic, many municipalities have asked that children not use playground equipment.)

Sparkling play

By the time Leadville embarked on its playground renovation, scientists had already identified several strategies for boosting playground activity. One of the first interventions to amass considerable research support used nothing more than some cans of colorful paint.

How a playground redesign changed student activity



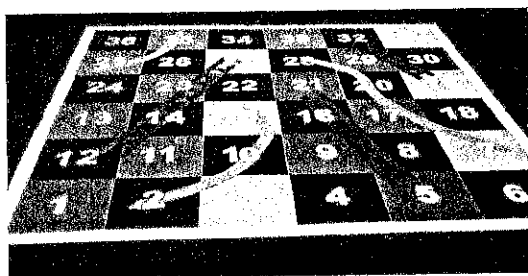

In the late 1990s, Gareth Stratton, a sports and exercise scientist then at Liverpool John Moores University in England, launched a pilot study at a local primary school. Stratton worked with the young students to develop a set of fun, brightly colored designs — including a castle, pirate ship, dragon, clockface, hopscotch board and maze — to paint on the playground surface.

The markings seemed to spark active, imaginative play and changed how students used the space, reducing the dominance of soccer and creating new play areas and opportunities for kids who might otherwise just opt out, says Stratton, now at Swansea University in Wales. “There’s no sitting on the sidelines anymore because there aren’t sidelines as such.”

When Stratton attached heart monitors to 36 of the schoolchildren, he discovered another benefit of the markings. During the month before markings were added, kids spent an average of 27 minutes of their daily recess time — which totaled about an hour a day, divided into three play sessions — engaged in moderate to vigorous physical activity, he reported in 2000 in

Ergonomics. In the month after the designs were painted, that number jumped to 45 minutes a day. The children's playtime heart rates also increased by an average of seven beats per minute. (The activity of children at a nearby school without the markings increased more modestly over the study period, from 29 minutes to 36, and there was almost no change in their heart rates.)

In the years since, Stratton and other researchers have confirmed and expanded upon these findings — and schools have put the lessons into practice. “This is something that’s actually had traction and is actually really useful in a real-world setting,” Stratton says.

In addition to playground markings, loose play equipment, like the balls and Hula-Hoops added at Leadville, can encourage kids to move more. Two studies published in 2019 in the *Journal of School Health* used a popular observational tool known as the System for Observing Play and Leisure Activity in Youth, or SOPLAY, to demonstrate the power of these supplies. To use SOPLAY, researchers systematically scan the play area, counting the

number of children who are sitting, walking or engaged in higher-intensity pursuits.

In the first study, the proportion of students engaged in moderate to vigorous physical activity at 19 schools in Los Angeles County was roughly 10 to 20 percentage points higher in play areas with loose equipment.

The second study, based in two school districts in Colorado, demonstrated that the more play equipment schools provided, the bigger the activity gains.

“If there’s something fun to do, kids will do it,” Kuo says. “Even something as simple as having a bunch of balls available and having Frisbees around — it’s just more fun than a random open field.”

Unconventional equipment

And the options go beyond traditional sports equipment. For Australia’s Sydney Playground Project, which began in 2009, researchers enrolled 12 inner-city primary schools and randomly assigned half to receive a two-part intervention.

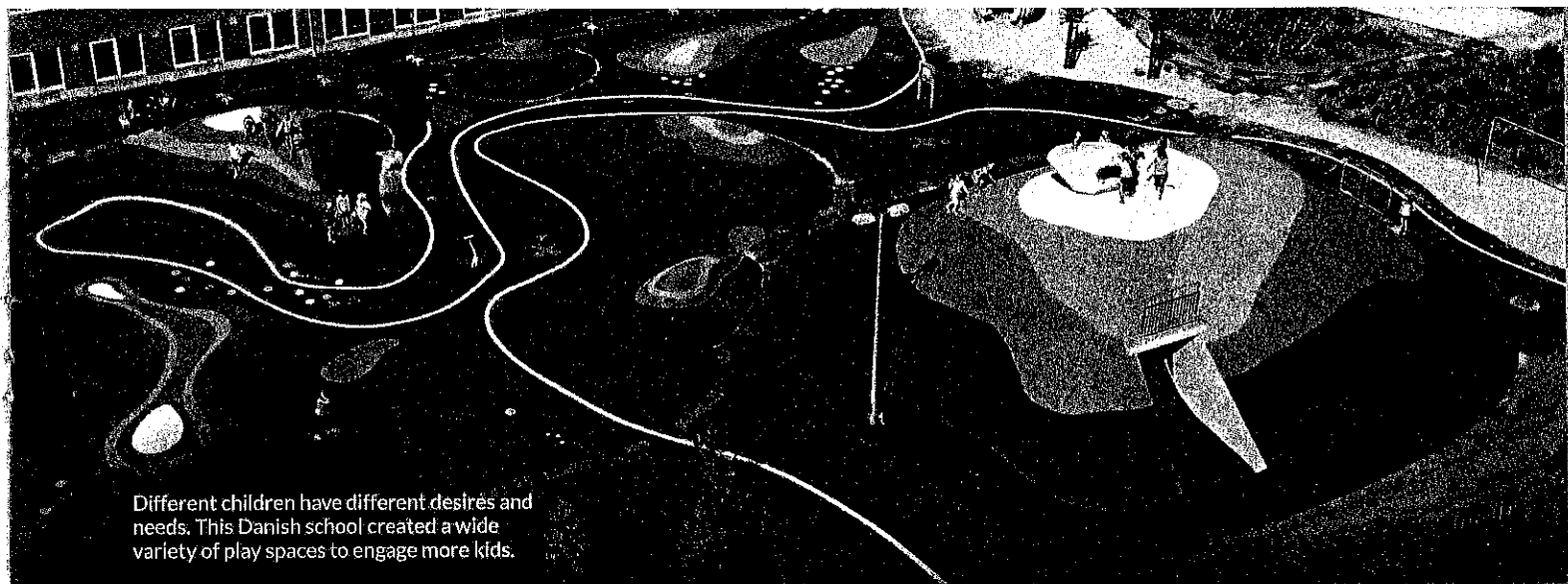
The playgrounds at the intervention schools were stocked with an assortment of recycled “loose parts” — hay bales, tires, crates and foam pool noodles. “We just put them on the playground with no instruction to the children about what you should do with them, and we asked the adults to try to step back from the children and let them do whatever they wanted,” says Anita Bundy, a play researcher who led the Sydney Playground Project at the University of Sydney. (She has since moved to Colorado State University in Fort Collins.)

To encourage adults to keep their distance, Bundy and colleagues put parents, teachers and school staff through “risk reframing” workshops designed to reinforce the idea that active, independent free play — even seemingly dangerous kinds of play, such as climbing trees or running down hills — has myriad benefits for kids.

The intervention was a hit. Many teachers and parents reported that the workshops gave them a new perspective on potentially perilous play, and the kids embraced the strange playground supplies. The children combined and recombined those materials “in zillions of different ways, and they loved that,” Bundy says. At one school, some kids created an imaginary amusement park with the loose parts. At another, students invented new sports. “They’d have a whole team full of people playing pool noodle hockey,” Bundy says.

Indeed, an in-depth analysis of one Sydney primary school revealed that the loose parts prompted kids to play more than they had before and to engage in more creative play and a wider variety of activities, the researchers reported in 2018 in the *Journal of Adventure Education and Outdoor Learning*.

In a separate analysis, Bundy and colleagues tracked students' activity levels using accelerometers fastened to the kids' clothes. After the intervention, students at the experimental schools spent 12 percent more recess time participating in moderate to vigorous physical activity than children at the control schools, the researchers reported in 2013 in *Preventive Medicine*.

However, the absolute increases were modest. The amount of time that kids at the intervention schools spent engaged in moderate to vigorous physical activity increased by just two minutes, on average. It's possible that the data from the accelerometers — which are better at picking up on when children start running than on the lifting, pushing, pulling, climbing and building that many of the kids were engaged in — underestimated the benefits of the loose materials.

But the results also highlight the limitations of relying on playgrounds as the singular secret to better child health. Recess tends to be short, and even "successful" interventions often add just a few extra minutes of activity to kids' days.

So some experts caution that while creating more active, appealing playgrounds may be a step in the right direction, getting kids to move more requires a multipronged approach. "I wouldn't put all my eggs in that basket," says Mark Tremblay, who directs the Healthy Active Living and Obesity research group at the Children's Hospital of Eastern Ontario Research Institute in Ottawa. Playgrounds, he says, are "one option, and I think

there needs to be many, many options."

Playground researchers argue that even small increases in activity matter, that a few extra minutes a day add up. "Is it enough? No it's not, but it's definitely a good step along the way," says Schipperijn, in Denmark.

And studies, which tend to report averages, might miss positive effects. A playground overhaul may prompt some kids to be *much* more active while having no effect whatsoever on others. "The chances that it will work for all children is very small," Schipperijn says. "Simply because different children need different things."

Though individual kids vary enormously, in general, boys tend to be more active than girls. Schipperijn's research suggests that at least some of the gender difference results from a social hierarchy in which boys tend to claim the most desirable amenities. Providing more play spaces could boost girls' participation.

Varied landscapes

Different kids are also attracted to different activities, so it's important to provide not just plenty of play spaces, but also varied ones.

In a study published in November 2019 in *Landscape and Urban Planning*, Schipperijn tracked students at three Danish schools before and after major playground renovations. Though each renovation was unique, in all three cases, the paved, mostly featureless schoolyards were converted into rich and varied playscapes. Each had some combination of sports courts, swings, four square and hopscotch markings, climbing structures, balance bars, trampolines, an obstacle trail, a climbing wall, hills, tree stumps and dedicated dancing areas with mirrors, loudspeakers and video screens. After the redesigns, there were more physical activity "hot spots" — for both boys

and girls — than before, the researchers found.

More structured play programs could also help pull the most sedentary kids into the action. That's what researchers have found in studies of Playworks, a nonprofit that sends full-time coaches into low-income American schools to organize group games and activities during recess.

Researchers studied the effects of the program in various demographic groups in a randomized controlled trial that enrolled 29 schools spread across six American cities. Seventeen of the schools were randomly assigned to receive Playworks, while the other 12 schools served as controls. In the control group, black students spent an average of 14.1 percent of their recess time engaged in moderate to vigorous physical activity, while white students spent 19.2 percent of recess being similarly active.

Playworks appeared to close this gap, prompting black students to spend 20.4 percent of recess in moderate to vigorous physical activity, while the activity levels of white students remained essentially steady, at 19.7 percent, scientists reported in 2016 in the *Journal of Physical Activity and Health*. In a separate study, researchers also discovered that Playworks prompted girls, but not boys, to move substantially more.

The program may have leveled the proverbial playing field, making it easier for less active kids to participate in schoolyard games. "The Playworks coaches ... were equally getting everyone involved and teaching kids games at the same time," says Martha Bleeker, a senior researcher involved in both studies at the policy research firm Mathematica. "It's not like one group had

ownership over that activity."

It's also possible that any effort to remake playgrounds yields the biggest dividends for the kids who are the least active, and who thus have the most room for improvement.

To get the most out of playground redesigns and programs, schools may also need to rethink certain practices and policies. In many schools in Australia, for instance, kids aren't allowed to play at recess if they don't have a hat to protect them from the blazing sun, says Anne-Maree Parrish, a childhood physical activity researcher at Australia's University of Wollongong.

In a randomized controlled trial published in 2016 in the *Journal of Science and Medicine in Sport*, Parrish found that providing loose play equipment alongside policy changes, including one that allowed hatless kids to play in the shade, boosted the share of break time that students spent in moderate to vigorous physical activity by 9 to 13 percentage points.

And even the best-designed playgrounds won't make much difference if kids don't get time to play on them. Although the share of U.S. school districts that mandate regular recess for elementary school students is up from 46 percent in 2000 to 65 percent in 2016, the average amount of daily recess time has actually ticked down slightly, from 30 minutes in 2000 to 27 in 2014.

"The biggest challenge at the moment is that time allocated to recess and lunchtime is decreasing in schools," says Nicola Ridgers, a researcher at the Institute for Physical Activity and Nutrition at Deakin University in Australia. "So it's really [about] trying to protect that time and make sure that kids have the opportunity to play."

While playgrounds won't single-handedly remedy the problem of childhood inactivity, they can be part of the solution — instilling a love of movement and setting the stage for a lifetime of healthy habits. As Parrish notes, "Any opportunity to try and increase their physical activity somewhere is always a bonus." ■

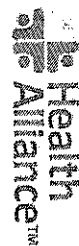
